In order for JFSA to serve its mission, nothing says it more clearly: **It Takes a Community**. Donors, volunteers, local businesses, and our committed board of directors and staff work tirelessly to provide the programs and services for which JFSA is known and trusted. Our extraordinary partnership with the Jewish Federation of Cleveland ensures that the most vulnerable in our community have access to quality care and support.

2010 has been a year of many accomplishments as we continue to lay the groundwork for an even stronger and more resilient organization. Of note, our recent merger with the Hebrew Shelter Home has enabled us to expand our continuum of services to women and children impacted by domestic violence and homelessness. The creation of the Center for Cognition and Recovery, a joint venture with PLAN of Northeast Ohio, provides a national stage for the dissemination of Cognitive Enhancement Therapy (CET). This successful therapy for individuals recovering from schizophrenia has additional potential application for people with other cognitive deficits and for individuals with Asperger's Disorder. Our new partnership with Mesila International will bring to Orthodox Jewish families in need a new program designed to help them achieve and maintain financial stability. Last year, over 2500 older adults received loving acts of kindness from our community. Supports ranging from the material (food baskets, new mattresses, dental care) to the emotional and spiritual, enable our older adult community to live with dignity and independence.

ASCENTIA: PATHWAYS TO COMMUNITY LIVING



Some of Laura Young's most cherished memories revolve around working at her family's business, a music store that sold compact discs, cassettes and records. A fan of classic rock, Laura fondly remembers sitting next to her father at work and answering the phone.

Laura Young was diagnosed with schizophrenia when she was 17 and lived with her parents until they passed away in the late 1990's. Living alone became a difficult challenge for Laura. She experienced seizures which caused her to sustain injuries that required medical attention. Sometimes she would go days without getting help.

Five years ago, Laura came to JFSA and worked with the intensive case management team and the psychiatrist to adjust her medications and to find a new home where she would not be alone and her medical needs could be addressed. Laura now lives in a group residence with adults who are in the recovery process and achieving their independence. "It's better. I don't have as much fear of being alone and being scared. I worry less about myself. I feel more comfortable and stable."

Laura's case manager, Molly, says Laura is flourishing thanks to JFSA. "When she lost her parents and the support they provided her, she was alone and afraid. Now that she has the support of JFSA and she's in a group home, Laura is communicating with others and enjoying social activities again."

There is no shortage of thanks from Zalman Donen to the many people who have helped him throughout his life. Zalman was born with cerebral palsy and is in a wheelchair. His relationship with JFSA began when he was in elementary school. “My mom had to find people to take care of me,” he recalls. An aide would come to his home and help him shower and get ready for bed.

In October 2009, Zalman moved into a new JFSA group home with two men with developmental disabilities. This is Zalman’s first time living away from his mother, and he admits it is an adjustment. “I have been able to navigate life because of JFSA,” Zalman says. “Now I live in a home with 24 hour staffing. This is a nice, warm, comfortable home. My mom would say this is the best thing for me.”

Zalman’s faith is an extremely important aspect of his life, and has received a lot of support from the Orthodox community as well. “People have offered to help me study religious subjects over the phone,” he says. He is active in his synagogue, Congregation Zichron Chaim, and has also become close

with students and families associated with Telshe Yeshiva in Wickliffe. “They have helped me tremendously with my spirituality. I feel like I am part of a family,” he says.

Today, Zalman works for United Cerebral Palsy of Greater Cleveland and hopes one day to move to New York and attend college.

Sheila and Marc Wyse: “We went everywhere. JFSA has been the most responsive, encouraging and positive in caring.”

Strength, determination and a refusal to never give up are just a few reasons why Marc Wyse has enjoyed professional and personal success. Marc is best known for the advertising agency he created over fifty years ago. While Wyse Advertising still thrives today, a lot has changed in Marc’s personal life.

Five years ago, Marc suffered a massive stroke that paralyzed the entire left side of his body. “He couldn’t swallow, he couldn’t even open his eyes,” his wife Sheila recalls. In the months following his stroke, Marc was in and out of many different hospitals and rehabilitation facilities, none of which was the right fit for his needs. “People told him, ‘You will never be normal, get used to it, there’s nothing we can do for you,’” Sheila remembers with frustration. But she knew her husband wasn’t a quitter.

Upon a recommendation from a close friend, Marc and Sheila contacted JFSA Care at Home. Today, Marc receives occupational, physical and speech therapy from JFSA. His progress has been swift and, as a result, he recently spoke about his career at the Union Club in downtown Cleveland. His JFSA speech therapist, who helped him prepare his remarks, was even in the audience that day to cheer him on. Of course Sheila was in the audience too. “I was amazed. I was so proud. The speech was difficult and he could have never done it without the help of JFSA,” she beams.

To Meta Goodman, husband Jerry is a hero. “He cared for me, our children, my mother and step-father. When my mother fell on hard times, he helped her financially for 20 years, and I didn’t even know it,” she says. When Jerry suffered a heart attack, Meta began to take on the role as caregiver. Recently, Jerry suffered a mild stroke and was in the hospital after a bad fall.

Jerry, a retired architect, designed the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton and other Hall of Fame museums around the country. Jerry was also an accomplished artist, who loved to paint, sketch and create sculptures.

Caregiving can be an overwhelming challenge. Meta decided she needed emotional help in caring for her husband, so she turned to the Older Adult Services division of JFSA’s Care at Home. “JFSA has been a part of my life for many years,” she said. “I used to volunteer with the agency and we had a family

therapist at one point. JFSA has always been there for me and my family.”

Today, Meta credits her new found strength to her social worker, Paige. “I’ve really depended on Paige tremendously to get me through this difficult time in my life,” she says. Meta knows as long as she needs the support, JFSA will be there for her.

Tena Roberto: "Thanks to JFSA's support, my new beginning has taken place. I am not rich or free of troubles, but I have peace and hope. Thank you JFSA for believing in me when I thought no one else did. I could not have done it without you."

Tena Roberto endured years of verbal, physical, and financial abuse at the hands of her husband while she battled an alcohol and drug addiction. Tena believed she deserved his abuse until she regained her sobriety. It was then that she turned to JFSA's Family Violence Services for help.

Tena attended Overcoming Powerlessness, an 8 week educational workshop that teaches women about the various forms of abuse and the cycle of violence. "It opened my eyes, I was in shock," Tena says. "I remember thinking, 'Oh my, I really am in a dangerous, abusive relationship.' It took me to a new level of understanding."

After Tena made the decision to leave her husband, JFSA helped her create a plan enabling her and her children to live independently on their own. She used the JFSA Food Pantry, received money for gas, food cards and a moving company. JFSA also connected Tena with the Cuyahoga County Homelessness Prevention Program, which provided her with financial support for an apartment deposit.

"Even though there have been lots of challenges, Tena remains committed to her goal of finding peace in her and her children's lives," Jen Roth, Tena's case manager says. "She won't give up."

The inspirational quote “Home is where your story begins” rings true for the women and families who come to the Hebrew Shelter Home. They come to the home to start over, to begin a life free of abuse or homelessness. Haya and Yosef Maayan serve an important role in that new start, as the home’s resident managers. They make sure everyone has a bed, clothing, food, laundry facilities and even access to a computer to look for jobs. “When people first come here, they are broken into many pieces. They have nothing and it’s a hard feeling. We make sure everyone feels they are part of a community,” Haya says.

Haya, an Ethiopian Jew raised in Israel, says she can relate to what families are experiencing. “It was so hard for me to come to a new country,” she remembers. “I was so shy, it was hard for me to communicate, but the shelter home was amazing. Even though everything was strange to me and we had very little, we had a home and felt comfortable.”

Now Haya and Yosef are the ones giving back and they aren’t the only ones. Individual donors and private foundations play a big role in the home’s existence. “Without their commitment to make sure there is a culturally-sensitive and specific response to Jewish homelessness and domestic violence, this home would not exist.”

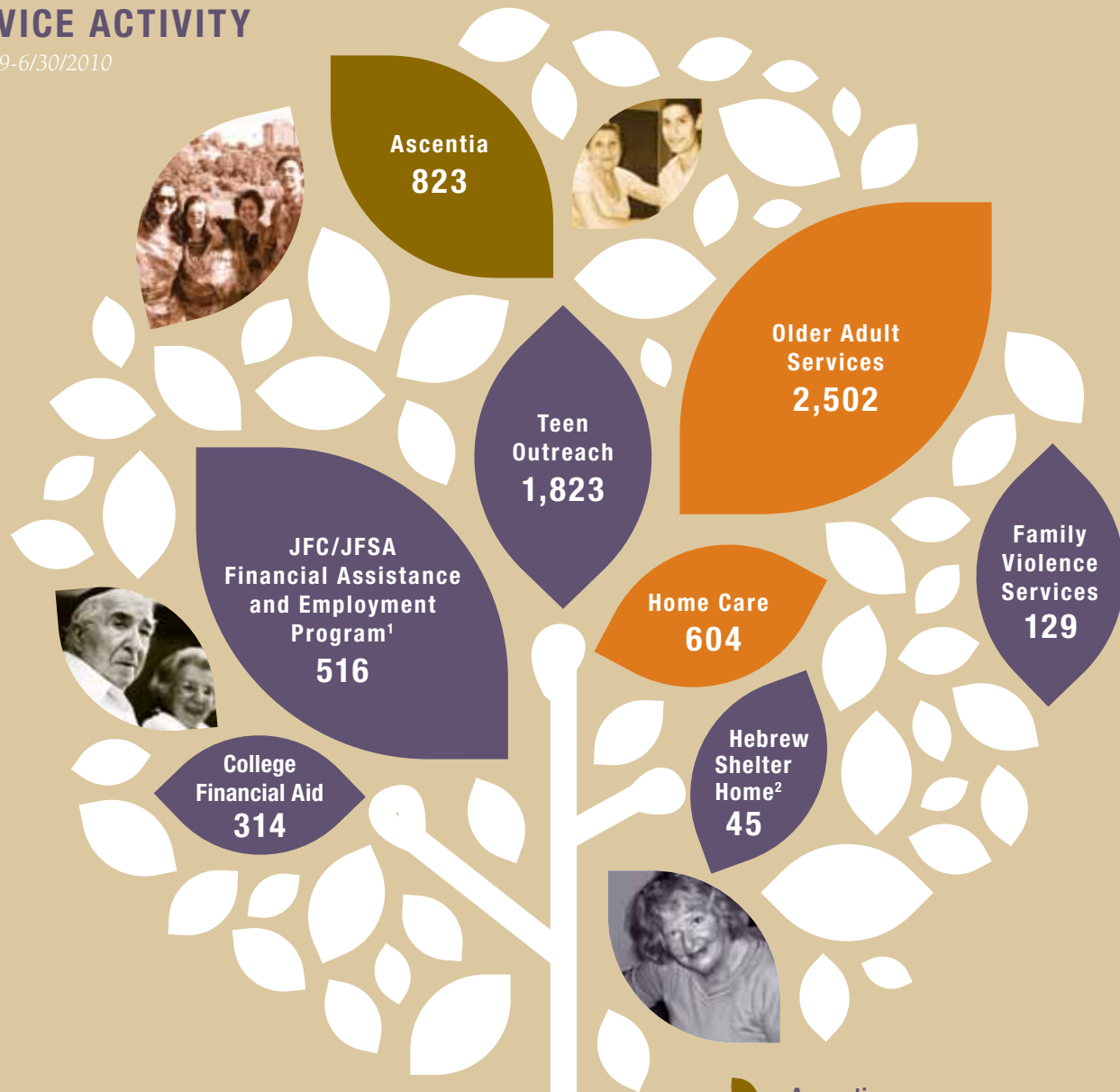
